The global pandemic has created challenges for FOW-USA as well. Challenges include shipping delays, increased cost of shipping, and restrictions on postal services. To ensure the organization can continue to ship ostomy supplies to countries around the world, our volunteers have responded in innovative ways demonstrating the resilience of this organization. FOW-USA achieved its' 35th year of serving ostomates in need around the world with 418,000 pounds of ostomy supplies sent to 96 countries. One can truly appreciate the growth when you consider that our earliest statistics revealed 30.000 pounds shipped to 17 countries! Stories of inspiration, resilience and optimism are shared on the FOW-USA Facebook and Instagram accounts from some of the individual lives that are touched in the countries we serve.

FOW-USA continues to grow with the focus on streamlining the process for donation on our website. Our volunteers were able to adapt to the virtual format for the National WOC Nursing Conference. The FOW-USA booth was

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able to operate and network with our target audience and promote our mission. Our organization's adaptability is evident with growth of social media presence. Email distribution of this newsletter increased by 70% this past year while distribution by regular mail decreased 50%. FOW-USA has increased the connection with our supporters by growing our (membership) database 17%.

It's true that the pandemic has been challenging to each and every one of us. Our communities are looking to medical professionals and researchers hoping to bring an end soon. It is my hope that in the meantime, we are compassionate, resilient, and adaptable during these challenging times. Let's use these trials to continue to push forward and even innovate so that we can continue to touch lives and deliver our message of hope for the future.


Everyone is looking forward to going back to the way it was beforepredictability with health, friends, travel, and family. It really makes you feel passionate about what you consider important in your life. What do you do when you discover that there is a close friend who is sick, and you cannot visit them? How can we make sense of difficult scenarios?

I had a patient who is surviving some unexpected complications with ulcerative colitis. This disease took her colon from her in 2016, and she thought that she would not survive. S

from her in 2016, and she thought that she would not survive. She suffered depression with episodes of sadness and tears. She felt lucky to have the support of a loving husband and a teenage son who gave her a reason to keep fighting through the experiences she had. They helped her navigate answers to her questions like, "how will I ever climb into our hot tub again?"

She talked very candidly about this experience, and her husband was sitting on the couch with her, arm around her shoulders. She struggles with her current situation of bowel blockages and a fistula development that requires her to wear multiple pouches. She gets sad when reality hits her that she may not be able to travel in retirement like she and her spouse have talked about with dreams leading their hopes.

We have developed a professional friendship throughout her illness. She had talked about all of the supplies that she has that have carried her through her illnesses the last few years. I shared information with her about FOW-USA and what our mission is for ostomates who have limited access to supplies and other resources. She asked me questions about the organi-



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zation and wanted to know, "how that works". She felt fortunate and happy that she would be able to donate "zillions" of supplies that she had at home.

Last week, I was surprised by five boxes of supplies from my patient with a note saying that she felt so fortunate to be able to give back to the people with nothing. She was happy that she had something that others could find useful. She wanted to give back to the health professionals that have helped her with her disease and the family and friends that supported her. She was so happy to help others....pearls you never forget, stories you will always tell. You can make a difference in someone's life and find the pearl that make them feel hope and happiness! Thank you so much for your donations, and your generosity for the people who are in need!

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Annual Board Meeting Update

As with so many face to face meetings that were planned for 2020, the annual Friends of Ostomates Worldwide-USA board meeting had to take place as a virtual meeting on October 4. Fortunately we have all gotten pretty savvy at this new way of conducting business and the meeting was flawless.

Led by President, Cindy Barefield, the group got right down to business approving and accepting the minutes from our last meeting and reviewing the set agenda. All committee chairs reviewed their reports and our main focus then became a review of our strategic plan accomplishments as well as an open discussion on moving forward on the two areas of concentration: communications and inventory. The group has done quite a bit on the goals set a year ago and continue to come up with new ideas and areas we can change and improve. The biggest challenge that we faced during the pandemic is our inventory. Demand has not decreased but supply donations has. Assuming donors are making less trips out and not going to the post office or to shipping companies could be a factor. Another challenge out of our control has been that some countries to which we ship have temporarily stopped receiving incoming shipments during Covid. We just have to hope that restrictions will ease up and we can begin shipping again.

The group also was presented an update to our contingency planning that has been taking place at the warehouse. Many volunteers have now been cross trained in areas that will ensure we have back-up plans for all of the functions we do.

Another highlight of our annual meeting has always been to announce the winner of that year's service award. You can read all about this year's recipient, Stephanie Borellis, on page 2 of this Newsletter.

We are a resilient bunch and since we are all spread all over the country, we are used to meeting all year virtually but all were sad to not be able to gather for our face to face meeting and to spend time at the warehouse with our volunteers on the Monday following the board meeting. We also were unable to sit for our annual Board of Director's photo shoot.

We are full steam ahead, open for business and accepting much needed supply donations.

Our meeting schedule for 2021 has been laid out and our annual 2021 "in person" meeting will take place in Louisville on October 2 & 3. Those who can will stay and work with our warehouse volunteers on Monday October 4.


June 2020 Nigeria

2020 - The Beginning of the Pandemic

Kenya, August 2020

Monicah Ndegwa is the Founder and Executive Director for Project Afya, a non-profit in Houston, Texas. Their mission is to improve public health in Kenya and across the world. She requested ostomy supplies for a teenager in Kenya, who had been separated from her conjoined twin sister, who did not survive.

After receiving the supplies, the father noted in a video: "I want to urge you to continue with the spirit of giving. Do not see this as an everyday thing - I live on the far end of Meru County and things have come all the way from America and reached a place like this. ...Glory is doing well. She has had 6 surgeries and her health continues to be good....Glory's story has touched a lot of people...."

I learn this from ostomates I visited each time to let you know that they need your help.

Dear Ruth, my mom has gone (pass away) few months ago. I and my family is always remembering the help your team has done to mom. You are always remembered for this in the family. Even if my mom is gone there are a lot of ostomates in Ethiopia. Recently a doctor working in hospital told me that two youths committed suicide after they done their surgery for permanent ostomy. This is heart breaking. Now I am deciding to establish a foundation that works in helping ostomates. Till then I will continue sending the address of ostomates who are in need of your help for ostomy supply. I have strong belief that your help to others will continue as it was to my mom. I am really thankful for this.
